Dear Church Family:

Did you know that Handbells are a descendant of church tower bells? The church buildings in the early 17th century were the center of the town. The bell or bells rang when there was a death, a birth, when the ovens were hot so you could come and bake your bread, or even when there was an invasion. Over time more bells were added to the towers. Change ringing emerged as a new musical expression. Change ringing is when all the bells are played without repeating the order of them. On 3 bells there are 6 variations. 1x2x3, on 5 bells there are 120 variations and on 12 bells there is an astonishing 479,001,600 variations

The patterns must be played from memory and it requires physical and mental stamina. It takes practice.....lots of practice. But it gets cold in those bell towers and it bugs the neighbors. The solution was to have smaller "practice" bells that could be played indoors without incurring cease and desist orders from the villagers. Soon Hand Bell playing became an art in itself.

English handbells (that's what we have) were brought to America by the Peak family in the 1830s and in 1840, P.T. Barnum created the Swiss Family Ringers. There was no Swiss connection at all except for the attire of the ringers. In 1923, Margaret Shurcliff of Boston organized the Beacon Hill Ringers.

I will never forget the televised change ringing at the conclusion of Princess Diana's funeral. The ringers at Westminster Abbey incorporated half muffled bells in the change pattern as is the English custom at funerals. You can You-Tube this to hear it.

A complete peal of 4 bells (24 changes) requires a couple of minutes; one of 12 bells (479,001,600 changes); about 40 years. And you thought the pastoral prayer could get long! Change ringing is a little known but interesting acoustical application of mathematics.

SEPTEMBER 27, 2020 PLEDGE INCOME REPORT

Annual Pledge Income Budget: \$225,000 Pledge receipts through September 27: \$166,000 We thank you for your gifts.

While we do not have the final September reports, we want to provide a September 27 estimate of where we stand and some projections. Pledge income through September 27 contains \$71,367 from full-year pledge donations. When we amortize these full-year gifts to evaluate giving after about three quarters, we find that pledge income is about \$20,600 less than expected for the ytd budgeted amount.

We are now 39 weeks into the budget year and an additional concern is that we have budgeted expenditures that exceed our budgeted income by \$14,763. We are falling seriously behind in pledge income and not making any progress on this additional deficit.

We have not seen the uptick in giving that usually occurred in September when people return from vacations. Looking ahead, this budgeted income shortfall will be compounded if the corona-virus restrictions extend through the end of the year. If there is no further loss of pledge income and if Holly Fair, Thrift Shop, Shopping Cards, Plate Income, Room Use and Special Income remain closed or restricted, a rough estimate of budgeted income shortfall is about \$46,000, which with the budgeted deficit becomes about \$67,000. While the \$56,200 SBA Payroll Protection Loan Program Loan will offset some budgeted and unbudgeted (Weekday Nursery School) salary expenses, it is apparent that we will end the year with a deficit, given that WUC committed to cover the Weekday Nursery School expenses through their 2019-2020 fiscal year. We realize that this is a difficult time for many people, but have to continue to ask "What can you do to help solve the budget deficit?"

Status reports reflecting your pledges and other giving through September will be prepared for mailing in October.

The response to the worship events planned and so beautifully presented by Pastor Chip, Reverend Paul, Mark and Deb has been wonderful, as has the generosity of people to the outreach collections at WUC. We have much to celebrate.

Please prayerfully consider how you can help and, again, thank you for your gifts.

Thanksgiving Video Project

We are going to assemble another all congregation video (similar to the Peace Project video) for Thanksgiving Sunday. Send in a video of yourselves expressing thanks or what you're thankful for, or a picture of yourselves that is appropriately autumnal, or harvest based (picture with a pumpkin, or out in a pile of leaves). We'll weave those together to be shared with all during our Thanksgiving Sunday service.

Videos or pictures will need to be submitted by <u>November 6th</u> to be included in the video. The length of your submission should be under 30 seconds. (That's a lot of time!)

Some hints for a good quality shoot:

- Film in a location where there is a lot of light on your face(s). Outside is a great place to film on a partially sunny day. The lighting source should be in front of you and behind the camera (the other way around makes for a dark shoot!) Film somewhere where it is relatively quiet. Traffic poise
- Film somewhere where it is relatively quiet. Traffic noise makes it hard to bring out a good sound quality on video. Likewise stay away from a windy day!
- Remember who your audience is! Think about what joy you are giving others in our church family by giving them the opportunity to see your faces and hear your voices. We're all missing each other and this is one way we can (sort of) be together. Therefore, don't think of this as a chore. Think of it as that greeting to your neighbor on a Sunday morning before or after church!





It's a good idea to do a test shot first and then watch it to make sure you've got a good focus and enough sound in your video.
